Upon thawing, the conversion of the liquid nitrogen back to its gas phase may result in the vial exploding or blowing off its cap with dangerous force creating flying debris. Unless necessary, ATCC recommends that these cultures be stored in the vapor phase of liquid nitrogen rather than submersed in liquid nitrogen.

## Handling Procedures

Frozen ampoules packed in dry ice should either be thawed immediately or stored in

liquid nitrogen vapor. If liquid nitrogen storage facilities are not available, frozen ampoules may be stored at or below -70°C for approximately one week. **Do not under any circumstance store frozen ampoules at refrigerator freezer temperatures** (generally -20°C). Storage of frozen material at this temperature may result in the death of the culture.

- To thaw a frozen ampoule, place in a 30°C water bath, until just thawed (approximately 5 minutes). Immerse the ampoule just enough to cover the frozen material. Do not agitate the ampoule.
- 2. Immediately after thawing, aseptically transfer the contents of the vial onto appropriate solid or liquid medium.
- 3. Incubate cultures at recommended temperature.
