## **Description**

Major pistachio pathogen that causes *Botrytis* Blossom and Shoot Blight. This strain was isolated in 1983 from Pistachio twigs (*Pistacia vera*) in California, United States.

ATCC highly recommends that appropriate personal protective equipment is always used when handling vials. For cultures that require storage in liquid nitrogen, it is important to note that some vials may leak when submersed in liquid nitrogen and will slowly fill with liquid nitrogen. Upon thawing, the conversion of the liquid nitrogen back to its gas phase may result in the vial exploding or blowing off its cap with dangerous force creating flying debris. Unless necessary, ATCC recommends that these cultures be stored in the vapor phase of liquid nitrogen rather than submersed in liquid nitrogen.

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## Growth Conditions

### Medium:

ATCC Medium 336: Potato dextrose agar (PDA)

**Temperature:** 24°C

**Atmosphere:** Aerobic

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## Handling Procedures

**Frozen ampules** packed in dry ice should either be thawed immediately or stored in liquid nitrogen vapor. If liquid nitrogen storage facilities are not available, frozen ampules may be stored at or below -70°C for approximately one week. **Do not under any circumstance store frozen ampules at refrigerator freezer temperatures (generally -20°C).** Storage of frozen material at this temperature may result in the death of the culture.

1. To thaw a frozen ampoule (or plastic vial), place it in a water bath maintained at **25°C to 30°C** until it just thawed (around 5 minutes). Immerse the ampule just enough to cover the frozen material. Do not agitate the ampule.
  2. Immediately after thawing, aseptically transfer the contents of the vial onto appropriate moist solid or liquid medium.
  3. Incubate cultures at recommended temperature.
