will slowly fill with liquid nitrogen. Upon thawing, the conversion of the liquid nitrogen back to its gas phase may result in the vial exploding or blowing off its cap with dangerous force creating flying debris. Unless necessary, ATCC recommends that these cultures be stored in the vapor phase of liquid nitrogen rather than submersed in liquid nitrogen.

Medium: ATCC Medium 1827: BHI with heat-inactivated fetal bovine serum and glucose Temperature: 37°C Atmosphere: Anaerobic

Handling Procedures

1. Thaw vial at room temperature. Under anaerobic conditions, aseptically withdraw contents of vial and transfer into a tube of #1827 broth.

2. Additional tubes of #1827 broth or slants can be inoculated with 0.5 ml each of the suspension, making a biphasic culture in the slants. Inoculate two sheep blood agar plates. One plate should be incubated anaerobically to view colony morphology; the other should be incubated aerobically to check for contamination.

3. Incubate tubes and plate under anaerobic conditions at 37°C for 3-5 days. Observe growth on slants as a film and on the plate as colonies ranging from a film of growth

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up to 1 mm irregular colonies with beta hemolysis. No growth should be seen on aerobic plate.

ANAEROBIC CONDITIONS:

Anaerobic conditions for transfer may be obtained by either of the following:

 \cdot Use of an anaerobic gas chamber, or

 Placement of test tubes under a gassing cannula system connected to anaerobic gas.

Anaerobic conditions for incubation may be obtained by any of the following:

· Loose screw caps on test tubes in anaerobic chamber,

 \cdot Loose screw caps on test tubes in an activated anaerobic gas pack jar, or

 \cdot Use of sterile butyl rubber stoppers on test tubes so that an anaerobic gas headspace is retained.

Notes

Always use freshly prepared pre-reduced media or pre-reduced media that has been previously prepared but stored under anaerobic conditions. Resazurin in the media is a color indicator for anaerobic conditions. Observance of pink color in medium before use or during incubation shows anaerobic conditions have not been met and oxidation has occurred. Medium should be discarded.
