# Description

HEK001 is a keratinocyte that was isolated from the scalp of a 65-year-old, male patient. The cells were transfected with plasmid p1321 which contains human papillomavirus (HPV) 16 E6 and E7 genes. ATCC highly recommends that appropriate personal protective equipment is always used when handling vials. For cultures that require storage in liquid nitrogen, it is important to note that some vials may leak when submersed in liquid nitrogen and will slowly fill with liquid nitrogen. Upon thawing, the conversion of the liquid nitrogen back to its gas phase may result in the vial exploding or blowing off its cap with dangerous force creating flying debris. Unless necessary, ATCC recommends that these cultures be stored in the vapor phase of liquid nitrogen rather than submersed in liquid nitrogen.

Temperature: 37°C Atmosphere: 95% Air, 5% CO<sub>2</sub>

## Handling Procedures

#### Unpacking and storage instructions:

1. Check all containers for leakage or breakage.

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2. Remove the frozen cells from the dry ice packaging and immediately place the cells at a temperature below -130°C, preferably in liquid nitrogen vapor, until ready for use.

**Complete medium:** Keratinocyte-Serum Free medium (GIBCO-BRL 17005-042) with 5 ng/ml human recombinant EGF and 2mM L-glutamine (without bovine pituitary extract and without serum)

**Handling Procedure:** To insure the highest level of viability, thaw the vial and initiate the culture as soon as possible upon receipt. If upon arrival, continued storage of the frozen culture is necessary, it should be stored in liquid nitrogen vapor phase and not at -70°C. Storage at -70°C will result in loss of viability.

- Thaw the vial by gentle agitation in a 37°C water bath. To reduce the possibility of contamination, keep the O-ring and cap out of the water. Thawing should be rapid (approximately 2 minutes).
- Remove the vial from the water bath as soon as the contents are thawed, and decontaminate by dipping in or spraying with 70% ethanol. All of the operations from this point on should be carried out under strict aseptic conditions.
- 3. Transfer the vial contents to a centrifuge tube containing 9.0 mL complete culture medium and spin at approximately 125 x g for 5 to 10 minutes.
- 4. Resuspend cell pellet with the recommended complete medium (see the specific batch information for the culture recommended dilution ratio) and dispense into a 25 cm<sup>2</sup> or a 75 cm<sup>2</sup> culture flask. It is important to avoid excessive alkalinity of the medium during recovery of the cells. It is suggested that, prior to the addition of the vial contents, the culture vessel containing the complete growth medium be placed into the incubator for at least 15 minutes to allow the medium to reach its normal pH (7.0 to 7.6).
- 5. Incubate the culture at 37°C in a suitable incubator. A 5%  $CO_2$  in air atmosphere is recommended if using the medium described on this product sheet.

**Subculturing procedure:** Volumes used in this protocol are for 75 cm<sup>2</sup> flask; proportionally reduce or increase amount of dissociation medium for culture vessels of other sizes.

- 1. Add 6.0 to 8.0 mL of medium with 10% FBS added and aspirate cells by gentle pipetting..
- 2. Briefly rinse the cell layer with Ca++/Mg++ free Dulbecco's phosphate-buffered

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saline (D-PBS) or 0.05% (w/v) Trypsin - 0.53 mM EDTA solution to remove all traces of serum, which contains trypsin inhibitor.

3. Add 2.0 to 3.0 mL of Trypsin-EDTA solution to the flask and observe cells under an inverted microscope until cell layer is dispersed (usually within 5 to 15 minutes).

**Note:** To avoid clumping do not agitate the cells by hitting or shaking the flask while waiting for the cells to detach. Cells that are difficult to detach may be placed at 37°C to facilitate dispersal.

- 4. Add 6.0 to 8.0 mL of DMEM with 10% FBS added and aspirate cells by gently pipetting.
- 5. To remove trypsin-EDTA solution, transfer cell suspension to centrifuge tube and spin at approximately 125 x g for 5 to 10 minutes.
- 6. Discard supernatant and resuspend cells in fresh growth medium. Add appropriate aliquots of cell suspension to new culture vessels.
- 7. Incubate cultures at 37°C.

**Subcultivation Ratio:** A subcultivation ratio of 1:3 to 1:4 is recommended **Medium Renewal:** Add fresh medium twice a week.

**Reagents for cryopreservation:** Dulbecco's Modified Eagle's Medium supplemented with 20% (v/v) fetal bovine serum and 10% (v/v) DMSO (ATCC 4-X).
